Wiser Driver Instructor Lee Knight

Wiser Driver is a free refresher course, funded by Vic Roads, designed to encourage people in their senior years to become safer drivers in a friendly, informal setting with no testing required.

Program instructor Lee Knight says Wiser Driver not only contributes to road safety, but helps older drivers keep their freedom.

Lee commented, "When someone has their licence either taken away or has to give it up for medical reasons, their loss of independence, their loss of personal well-being, the loss of sense of identity, can all impact their mental health. So, by keeping people on the road longer and safer we are ensuring that they have a more fruitful retirement."

The program is run over a four-week period, consisting of a two-hour session each week and teaches participants about things such as how driving has changed over the years, the effects medicines can have of driving, how to keep a car in good condition, how to assess your own driving and how to plan for the future.

Lee has just concluded another course at the Leopold Community & Learning Centre and all who have attended the course have appreciated her knowledge and expertise.

'What about the floor plan?' Derek barked.


Terry shuffled through the drawings. 'Your brief was very specific with what you wanted, so I've produced this. Bearing in mind it's only a first draft waiting for your input.'

TRISTAN'S TECH TIPS

Printers - Should I buy the cheap one?

Some printers have an outstandingly low upfront cost, everything is going great until it's time to replace the ink cartridge. It's then that you notice something, the new ink costs close to or more than the cost of the printer itself.

How is this possible? Well, many printing manufacturers lower the price as much as they can stand with cheaper parts & some cost eating on their part in order to get you spending big bucks on their ink. Not to mention many alternative inks (to theirs) won't work in their printer. This is deliberate on their end, after all they make far more profit on the easy to dry out ink than the machine itself!

So, should I buy the \$50 printer from Kmart?

If you plan on printing semi-frequently so the \$30-\$60 ink doesn't dry out (I'm still miffed about losing over \$60 worth ink once myself) then sure.

If you don't print much at all – then I'd recommend not buying a printer at all – or a laser (non-ink) printer which will last longer before cartridges are replaced.

If you are a very frequent printer I would recommend saving up for a more robust printer that should last longer in the long run.

And if you are budget minded & plan on printing mainly in mono (black & white) colour I really do recommend a mid-range (\$130-\$200+) laser printer that takes toner cartridges. Many boast replacement cartridges that seem costly, typically around the \$90 range but they also claim to typically last around 1000-1200 pages at around the typical cost of 7 cents per page in mono. Not bad at all if you need to print lots of pages in the long run.
