

TRISTAN'S TECH TIPS

Second-Hand vs Refurbished

We have all considered buying some preloved tech at a discount price. I have a preloved keyboard; it would have retailed for well over \$150 maybe more when new but I got it for \$40. Nearly 3 years later and it's still good as new apart from some cat hair in between the keys.

But some anxiety is absolutely normal when buying old tech. Here is the difference between Second Hand (Preowned) and refurbished.

Second Hand:

Consider this an "as is" purchase. It could be barely touched or heavily used. Its condition/battery etc. is all potentially unknown. To an extent we need to trust the buyer on their word. If possible, ask to inspect and confirm its working order before you buy. This is the most common way to sell old things. You could buy it from Gumtree, Facebook Marketplace etc. The point is, it is usually bought from just another person and not a company. However, many companies still sell products "As is" and it's important to read descriptions if buying the product online. You can get absolute bargains buying second hand so it can be well worth your time, just watch out for the occasional scammer.

Refurbished:

Refurbished products are inspected, graded (the higher the grade the less scratches ext.) and often have components replaced like screens (if cracked) or batteries (which often die after a few years) They cost more on average than just buying Second Hand but have a warranty attached and are generally a good idea for smart phones for the new battery alone.

Generally refurbishers know what price the product commonly sells for so don't expect a huge bargain.

I hope that clears up some confusion around buying old tech. Buying Second Hand or Refurbished can be a great way to buy a product at a cheaper price and reduce electronic waste in an increasingly disposable world.

Another successful meeting of the Leopold Community Centre Garden Club was held in March. Not only did the meeting cover details over the planting of spring bulbs but many types of bulbs were given out.

These bulbs included: Dutch irises, daffodils, jonquils, daylilies, all generously given by members and friends of the group.
