VicRoads unsafe2safe trial program is helping young drivers – 18 to 25 years – in regional Victoria into newer and safer vehicles.

The unsafe2safe trial program will provide up to 1000 eligible young, regional Victorians a \$5000 subsidy to purchase a newer, safer vehicle, when they scrap an old one. A young driver is 15 times more likely to be killed in crashes involving older vehicles than the state average. By driving a newer car, drivers reduce the risk of dying in a car crash by up to 80%.


Safe Seats Safe Kids visited the Centre in August and helped correctly fit child car restraints.

TRISTAN'S TECH TIPS

Air Purifiers

One interesting piece of tech that's getting very popular is the air purifier. This is useful for the upcoming allergy season because it can reduce the dust, pollen, mold spores and pet dander levels in the home. They typically have filters with charcoal that capture all those particles as well as their smell.

If you live in areas that get smoky during bush fire season in high summer or you or your neighbor have an outdoor fire pit it can also reduce the smoke levels in the house too and give you some breathing room.

Some are also coolers or heaters as well which can be convenient in either winter or summer.

Many claim to be anti-microbial or reduce bacteria and virus levels in the house too but I'm not a doctor or scientist so I don't know if that is just marketing speech because of the fine filters they use to trap tiny particles.

Keep in mind they have an effective area which varies by model so unfortunately one air purifier can't work for the entire house unless you periodically move it from room to room.

These things are not cheap, but may well be worth it for allergy sufferers, asthmatics and people who have houses with lots of particles in the air which have been causing them respiratory distress.







The August meeting was well attended with 5 new attendees; a selection of plants were given away which included strawberry seedlings, parsley seedlings, chrysanthemum seedlings, snapdragon seedlings, and plants such as Hippeastrum, ginger and geraniums.

The topic of the month was Terra Preta (Portuguese for Black Earth) a soil found in the Amazon Basin. It was not a naturally occurring soil, but a very sophisticated form of compost with its blackness coming from the charcoal used in its preparation. When analysed it was found to contain pottery shards, animal bones, animal and human faeces, vegetable waste and charcoal. The Terra Preta was extremely rich in nutrients and was very high in micro-organisms. The Amazonian Basin has very poor soils generally because of the high rainfall causing nutrients to be leached away. This has resulted in a slash and burn form of farming; the rainforest is cut down burned farmed for a year or two by which time the nutrients have been leached out and the farmers move on. Where there are Terra Preta deposits (can be up to 2 metres deep, Terra Preta can regenerate itself at around 1 cm per year) crops can be grown year after year these deposits were the basis for sustaining of large city populations in ancient Inca and Aztec times. In recent work on Terra Preta, increase in yields of 18 to 40% are not unknown, when it has been applied to poor quality soils. Much work has been done to replicate the black soil not with great success. Charcoal is a major component it helps hold moisture and absorbs many of the minerals and nutrients for use by the plants. Water holding capacity can be increased by more than 10%. Just using charcoal alone leads initially to a loss of nutrients as these are initially absorbed by the charcoal until saturation is reached. The use of charcoal as soil improver has resulted in a product called Biochar. It is available commercially but is guite expensive for broad scale farm use.

The next meeting will be about soil analysis with the chance to get some simple methods to do your own analysis at home and will include the sharing of a range of seeds both flower and vegetable. So come along to the Leopold Community Centre at 1pm on the 3rd Monday of the month Cost \$5.00 (cuppa and a biscuit included)
